It is important that members of the Fort Hood Metroplex communities understand the impact of the Armed Forces at Fort Hood. Recently published data and information is available to the public. Key areas of interest follow:

Fort Hood has deployed and redeployed more than 852,000 soldiers in support of overseas military operations since 2003.

In January, Fort Hood broke ground on the Army's largest renewable energy project, an on-post farm with 63,000 solar panels and an off-site wind turbine farm capable of generating 40% of the installations energy needs.

Fort Hood has the most employees on a single site in the State of Texas.

Estimated contributions of Fort Hood to the Texas Economy, 2015: a. Direct employment: 60,159; b. Direct and indirect employment: 201,538; c. Output: \$35.4 Billion; d. Gross Domestic Product: \$21.0 Billion.

Population associated with Fort Hood: 27% of Bell and Coryell County Population.

Regional average military employment wages are 20% higher than the State Military average.

From 2004 to 2014, Central Region military average wages grew by \$19,865 or 47%.
