FYI: Water Education

The Brazos River and its tributaries begin as a trickle in the west (generally along the Texas/New Mexico border) and gain momentum as the river heads south. By the time it reaches the Gulf of Mexico, the Brazos River basin has provided billions of gallons of water each year for cities, agriculture, industry and mining. Recreational opportunities - such as boating, swimming and fishing - are abundant.

The authority manages 11 reservoirs. Belton and Stillhouse provide water for our area. As of 11 April, Lake Belton is 9% about the conservation pool; Stillhouse 2% or 44' and 37' below flood level respectively. In the last 24 hours, Belton gained 2.21" and Stillhouse 0.91" of rain water. Eight of the eleven reservoirs are full at the conservation pool level.
